What Have We Been Up To?

San Juan Ridge Taxpayers The Association has been busy, working with environmental professionals and local decision makers to address the threat to groundwater, property values, our schools, and public health posed by the application to re-open the San Juan Ridge Mine, known in the 1990's as the Siskon Mine. The application was submitted to Nevada County in February 2012. Although the mine applicant wished to use the old documents from the failed Siskon Mine, the Nevada Dept. made a County Planning determination that a new Environmental Impact Report was needed. The Siskon Mine caused domestic and public wells to fail and caused changes in the fractured bedrock aquifer in the heart of the Ridge. Last December, during the County's standing room only public scoping meeting for the EIR, many Ridge residents spoke about the physical and emotional damage the mine caused our community when it last operated.

In 1993, the County issued a use permit for the Siskon Mine, supported by an Environmental Impact Report that asserted there was no connection between the groundwater in the diggings gravels and groundwater in the underlying and surrounding bedrock aguifer from which local wells are drawn. This theory proved to be wrong. Siskon started digging its decline tunnel in 1994. Two months later, a nearby domestic well failed. In September 1995, blasting in the mine intercepted a huge underground fracture and by January 1996, the drained fracture had caused approximately 12 more wells to fail, including those of the North Columbia Schoolhouse Cultural Center

and Grizzly Hill School. Millions of gallons of water were pumped out of the mine and discharged into Spring Creek. And our school kids had to drink bottled water for 9 years, while the district spent over a hundred thousand dollars trying to treat water that had become contaminated with an unbearable mineral load as a direct result of mine activities.

It is now 18 years later and the same mine CEO, Tim Callaway, wants to reopen the same mine and start a massive pump dewatering program that will likely cause more damage to the community's water wells and discharge millions of gallons of water into Spring and Shady creeks.

The SJRTA is mounting an aggressive and expensive campaign, recruiting the best scientific and legal professionals we can find to address the claims made by the applicant, and to prepare comments deficiencies on or assumptions that may be found in the Draft Environmental Impact Report that we expect will be released in early fall. When that report is issued, the SJRTA and the general public will have a minimum of 45 days to make comments. Towards the end of this period, the Planning Commission will hold a public meeting to hear testimony from the public on the adequacy of the EIR. This is our chance to fill the Board Chambers at the Rood Center while we carefully examine this critical environmental document and lav out our case for how destructive the mine could be for our community.
